Memories serve as an internal framework through which we structure our understanding of ourselves, others, and our past experiences, but they are not infallible. My work explores the subjectivity of perception, how that becomes memories that distort over time, and the weight of those memories we carry with us. Recognizing that each of our individual journeys is as unique and complex as those around us can facilitate a shift in how heavily our memories weigh on us.

I relate these ideas to rocks because we often think of stone as static, unyielding, and unchanging; but over time stone will erode, change shape, and reveal hidden secrets. None of these changes happen spontaneously as they are the result of external forces interacting with each stone. In this way, memories are a lot like rocks. They are markers of place and time, subject to the transformations of external and internal forces that continue to tumble and shape them long after they're formed.

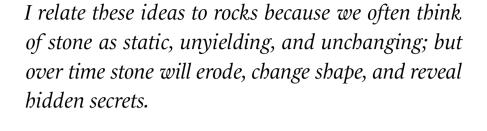

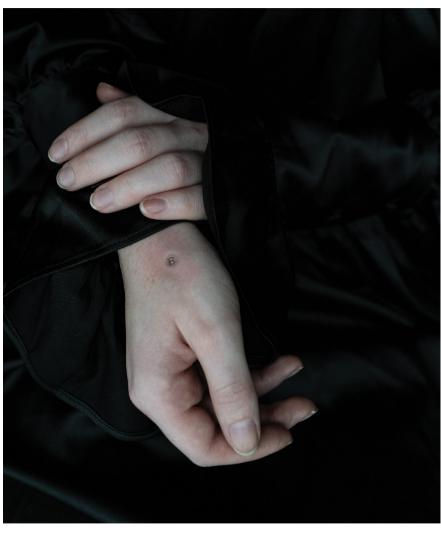

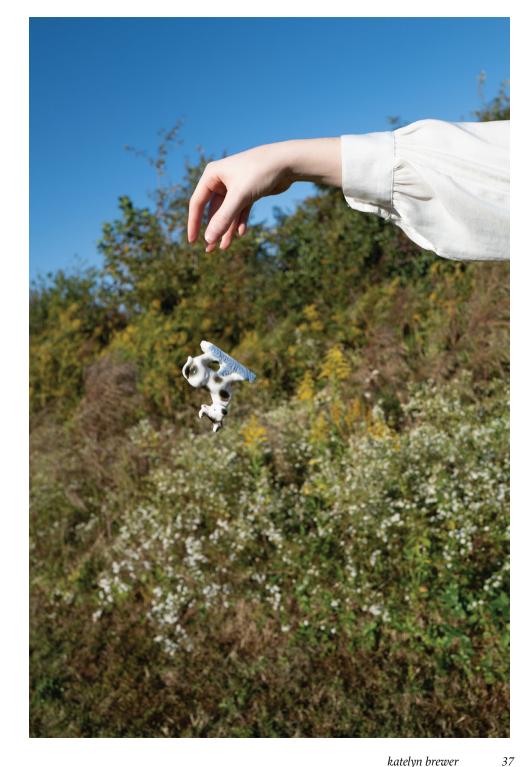

My ceramic work explores materiality and the expression of chemical interactions within glazes. I enjoy the "why?" in all areas of my life, particularly in my art practice. Therefore, I experiment with recipes and processes to express colors, textures, and depth within surfaces. My process is highly calculated- make a new glaze, fire with a specific schedule, analyze results, and then tweak the recipe until it is perfect. My obsessive

nature has driven me to understand what each chemical in the glaze does and how I can make them behave in certain ways by changing small variables. For my vessels, I have found that even, rounded forms for the glaze to flow over work best. Additionally, a narrow neck or closed form is ideal. I believe that a utilitarian vessel paired with my glaze would detract from the details of my work.

Onggi, a traditional pottery of Korea utilitarian vessel, has been used by most households to store Korean fermented foods dating back thousands of years. Unlike other distinctive types of Korean ceramics such as jade-green celadon, white porcelain, and Buncheongsagi, Onggi, the aged-old stoneware, is used as utilitarian living vessels to contain fermented foodstuffs for a long time. As a Korean Onggi potter and ceramic artist, I have researched and explored making Korean Onggi pottery in American circumstances and attempted to transform it to an aesthetic form during the past three years, and eventually, reaching to the specific conceptual themes: Diversity and Nature.

As a minority artist in diverse society, I am interested in co-existing in harmony expressed with various medium and realms on Onggi pottery. Furthermore, as we are a part of nature as well as being full of diversity, there is nothing more beautiful than the natural world for aesthetic motifs to be considered.
